I'd like to update you on some important changes we made in the recent Budget, the next steps in National's programme to build a stronger New Zealand, and some of the results we are achieving for you in government.

HELPING FAMILIES

The economy is growing and supporting families with more jobs and higher incomes. A stronger economy means we can provide extra support for families in a way that is effective and affordable.

Around 400,000 children between six and 13 will benefit from free GP visits and prescriptions from 1 July 2015.

4 weeks extra paid parental leave

We're expanding paid parental leave to reflect modern working arrangements and today's diverse family structures. We're extending paid parental leave to 18 weeks, starting with a two-week extension from 1 April 2015, and another two weeks on 1 April 2016. We're including caregivers who aren't parents (for example, permanent guardians) in the scheme, and extending payments to people in less-regular work or who recently changed jobs.

Boosting parental tax credits

From 1 April 2015, we're increasing the maximum parental tax credit to \$220 a week, and extending it by two weeks to ten weeks. We're also better-targeting payments to lower and middle-income families.



Support for vulnerable children

The Budget provides \$33 million extra to help vulnerable children. This includes eight new children's teams working with at-risk children and their families.

Increasing participation in early childhood education

We're providing \$156 million more to help early childhood centres stay accessible and affordable, meet demand pressures, and lift participation towards our 98% target. ECE spending has almost doubled from over \$800m in 2007/08 to \$1.5 billion in 2013/14.



NATIONAL'S PROGRAMME

1. RESPONSIBLE FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

Paying down debt

After the Global Financial Crisis and the Canterbury Earthquakes, National has got the Government's accounts back in surplus - one of the few countries in the developed world to do so. We're locking in these hardwon gains by keeping government spending in check to reduce pressure on mortgage rates. We will continue to run government surpluses and start paying down debt. We will also keep up spending on the frontline services families need - such as health and education.

"The best thing about this Budget is that the Government's finances are back in surplus next year. That gives people confidence and security that we will be able to maintain the services they rely on from education right through to health."

2. A STRONGER ECONOMY

More jobs and higher wages

National is building a more competitive and productive economy to provide more jobs and higher incomes. Our business growth agenda is driving change:

- Encouraging investment in research and development, to lift innovation.
- Increasing exports, to lift economic growth and living standards.
- Ensuring New Zealand has high performing capital markets that support investment, growth, and jobs.
- Improving workplace safety and growing the economy through a skilled workforce.
- Better using our natural resources, so we can continue to grow our economy and look after our environment.
- Providing better infrastructure such as roads, electricity networks, commuter rail in Auckland and Wellington, and ultra-fast broadband.

National is protecting the environment while supporting more jobs and better living standards. Our programme includes:

Improving home affordability



will improve affordability and help more people achieve the Kiwi dream of owning their own home. We are increasing land supply by allowing fast-track development in special housing areas. We're improving the RMA to further reduce unnecessary costs and delays. We're also reining in council development charges, increasing productivity in the construction sector, and reducing building costs. From July tariffs and duties on residential construction materials will be suspended.

3. BETTER PUBLIC SERVICES

Better healthcare when you need it

National is investing more in health. Budget 2014 spends \$15.6 billion on health - the most ever. That includes extra funding for programmes that will benefit families. Children with profound hearing loss will be able to get two cochlear ear implants. We're expanding free drop-in sore throat clinics to target 90,000 more children at risk of rheumatic fever. We're providing \$110 million for more elective operations, such as hip, knee, and other surgeries. And we've set aside \$33 million for faster cancer treatment. We'll continue our focus on delivering better frontline services. That means more doctors and nurses, less waiting, and better primary care.



Lifting achievement in education

We're investing \$359 million and introducing new roles in schools for the best teachers and principals to help them lead a step change in student achievement. Children and teachers will also benefit from the Network for Learning, and our 21st Century Schools building programme.

Supporting vulnerable children

- → Reduce the incidence of rheumatic fever by two-thirds by June 2017.
- → Halt the 10-year rise in children experiencing physical abuse and reduce current numbers by 5% by 2017.

4. REBUILDING CHRISTCHURCH

Building momentum

National is standing beside the people of Canterbury as we rebuild Christchurch. This work will take time, but it is already having a huge effect. In almost every measure, the region is moving ahead – retail sales,

employment, house and section sales, and dwelling approvals. Budget 2014 provides \$50 million more for the rebuild, bringing the Government's commitment to \$15.4 billion.

Projects underway

- \$300 million Justice and Emergency Services Precinct.
- \$650 million hospitals rebuild.
- \$1.1 billion schools plan.
- \$1.8 billion horizontal infrastructure.
- Moving 1700 staff from government agencies into the CBD by 2016.
- The Avon River Precinct and Hagley Oval.
- \$53 million bus interchange.




OUR RESULTS

Better healthcare

Despite difficult financial times, we've increased health spending every year, and shifted resources to frontline services. 93% of two-year olds are fully immunised. Every cancer patient ready for radiation and chemotherapy treatment is getting it within four weeks. There are 1500 more doctors and 3700 more nurses working in our public health service.
